### The Exe Estuary Trail


**Part of the National** Cycle Network (Route 2)

# Exe Estuary shore code

Be safe: don't put yourself or others at risk. Be aware of the dangers from rising tides, soft mud, cliff edges and strong currents.

Fish wisely: avoid waste. Only take bait for planned trips, don't discard tackle and return unwanted fish to the sea.

Prevent litter: bin litter or take it home with you.

check information at access points.

Be considerate to other estuary users: always keep pets under control and don't block access points.

Protect and avoid disturbing wildlife: enjoy watching the wildlife but keep your distance, especially from birds gathering at high water.


